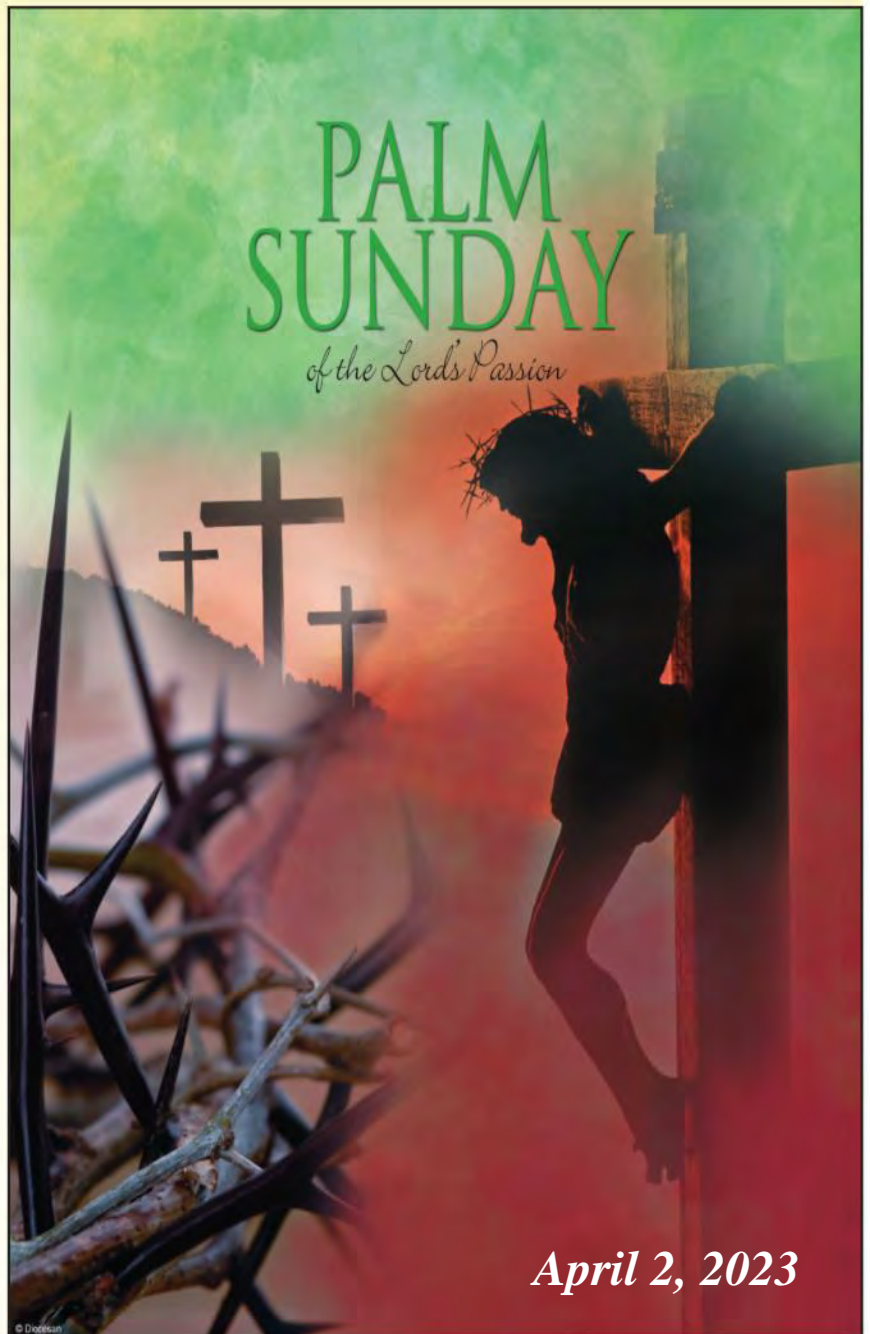

### *Gospel for Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion, Cycle A - Matthew 26:14 — 27:66*

"Peter said to him in reply, 'Though all may have their faith in you shaken, mine will never be.'" Peter thought pretty highly of his faith. On the eve of Christ's death he professed, in essence, that he was more committed to Jesus than anyone else. And yet, we know how the story turns out: when put to the test in the moment that mattered, Peter "began to curse and to swear, 'I do not know the man.'"

On this Palm Sunday, we hear many stories of betrayal. The crowds, who once hailed Jesus with "hosannas," will soon be chanting, "Let him be crucified!" Judas, who was counted among the closest companions of the Lord, turns him over to the chief priests for thirty pieces of silver. And Peter falls short in the moment of truth, and then "went out and began to weep bitterly."

Here in the hours before Christ faces crucifixion, he is surrounded by false friends. Just when he most needs the support, he is abandoned. No wonder he feels the suffering even of being forgotten by his Father while he hangs on the cross, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" What trials Jesus endured, not only physically but emotionally as well.

It is easy to glaze over this as a story from the past that does not involve us. But in truth, Jesus suffered all of this for each one of us. He would have preferred things to go otherwise, but submitted to his Father's will because he knew "it must come to pass in this way." Jesus' passion and death took place in order to bring us salvation. So today, may we not be counted among his many betrayers, but may we be truly grateful for the gift of the cross and show it through a life of sincere faith.

**REFLECTIONS** Palm Sunday - Lent offers us a time to reflect on our discipleship. How well are we following the example Jesus gave us? 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## HOLY WEEK

Holy Week has as its purpose the remembrance of Christ's passion, beginning with his Messianic entrance into Jerusalem. On Palm Sunday we bless palms at every mass and we read the Passion of the Lord.

**Chrism Mass:** On Holy Thursday, at 10:30 a.m. in St. John the Evangelist Cathedral, Lafayette, Bishop Deshotel and the priests of the diocese concelebrate the Chrism Mass. It is at this mass the Bishop blesses the Holy Oils of the Sick and of Catechumens, as well as consecrates the Holy Oil of Holy Chrism. These oils are used during the year in the celebration of the sacraments of baptism, confirmation, holy orders and the sick. These oils will be received into Nativity of Our Lady Church at 6:50 p.m. before the 7:00 p.m. evening Mass of the Lord's Supper.

## THE EASTER TRIDUUM

The holiest three days of the liturgical year are the Easter Triduum (Latin for three days), which begins on the evening of Holy Thursday and continues through Easter Sunday evening.

**How are these days measured?** The ancient people measured the end and beginning of a day when the sun sets. The first day of the Easter Triduum begins on Holy Thursday when the sun sets and continues on Good Friday until the sun sets. The second day of the Easter Triduum begins at sunset on Good Friday and continues until the sun sets on Holy Saturday. The third day of the Easter Triduum begins at sunset on Holy Saturday and continues until the sun sets on Easter Sunday. For practical purposes we say the Easter Triduum begins with the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday and continues until Evening Prayer on Easter Sunday.

Through the centuries, Christians have set these days aside – free of social engagements, entertainment and work, if possible. It is a time of prayer, special fasting, and expectation.

**The Triduum is "all one piece,"** that is, one single celebration of the dying and rising of Christ (referred to as the Paschal Mystery). The Holy Thursday evening Eucharist recalls the Last Supper and draws Christians into Jesus' suffering, dying and rising. The heart of the Good Friday Liturgy is the Passion according to John and the veneration of the cross. In the night of Holy Saturday and through the morning of Easter Sunday, Christians bless the new fire and baptismal water, celebrate Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist – and experience the "passing over" of Christ from death to life.

**Adoration at all adoration chapels is suspended during the Easter Triduum. Also confessions,** while not suspended in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Edition of the Roman Missal during the Easter Triduum, are not scheduled during the Easter Triduum at Nativity of Our Lady Church. Please attend to confession during Lent and Easter Times. Adoration in the Adoration Chapel is suspended at 12:00 p.m. on Holy Thursday and resumes on Easter Monday at 8:00 a.m. Ordinarily confessions resume on Easter Sunday at sunset (the end of the third day); although for practical purposes we say confession resumes on Easter Monday.

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## Eucharistic Revival - April 2, 2023

A month ago on March 5, 2023, the Second Sunday of Lent, we read the Gospel of Matthew 17:1-9. It was the gospel of Jesus' Transfiguration. In the tradition of the Church, it is believed that Jesus' Transfiguration occurred 40 days before Good Friday. It happened to encourage the apostles in regard to Jesus' dying and rising. As they were coming down the mountain, Jesus tells Peter, James and John, **"Do not tell the vision to anyone until the Son of Man has been raised from the dead."**

Coming to mass today, April 2, 2023, we come to Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord. We begin Holy Week today, preparing for The Sacred Paschal Triduum. On Holy Thursday we focus on the Lord's Supper. On Good Friday we focus on Jesus' passion and death. On the evening of Holy Saturday and Easter Sunday we focus on Jesus' Resurrection. At the Lord's Supper Jesus commits Himself to Die for us, paying the price of the sin of Adam and Eve, dying to redeem us of original sin. Jesus dies on Good Friday and is buried. On Easter Sunday, his tomb is empty. Jesus is not in the tomb. Jesus has risen from the dead. Jesus appears to His followers. In dying and in rising, Jesus restores our life to its original holiness before the fall of Adam and Eve. When we are baptized, we share in His death and resurrection and are like Adam and Eve before the fall. We have God's life in us. We become part of the mystical Body of Christ. Together we are one in the Body of Christ.

As one in the Mystical Body of Christ, we join Jesus when we gather for mass. We offer ourselves to the Heavenly Father's Will with Jesus and we receive Jesus in Communion. Jesus feeds us the Father's Life and helps us bring the Father's Life by the way we live to the world. Jesus in the mass, in the Eucharist, functions as the heart of the Mystical Body of Christ. He is our Way, our Truth, and our Life to the Heavenly Father. We share with Jesus the Heavenly Father's Life. While it takes three days to happen, it is one whole event. Just like the mass is one whole event.

In the preface on the Second Sunday of Lent we read, **"For after he had told the disciples of his coming Death, on the holy mountain he manifested to them his glory, to show, even by the testimony of the law and the prophets, that the Passion leads to the glory of the Resurrection."** At the Last Supper Jesus connected the dots. He said, **"TAKE THIS, ALL OF YOU, AND EAT IT, FOR THIS IS MY BODY, WHICH WILL BE GIVEN UP FOR YOU."** **"TAKE THIS, ALL OF YOU, AND DRINK FROM IT, FOR THIS IS THE CHALICE OF MY BLOOD, THE BLOOD OF THE NEW AND ETERNAL COVENANT, WHICH WILL BE Poured OUT FOR YOU AND FOR MANY FOR THE FORGIVENESS OF SINS."** **"DO THIS IN MEMORY OF ME."** (SOURCE: Prepared by Msgr. ## **WHY DO WE DO THAT?**

### **- CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED**

**Q: What are the servant songs of Isaiah? How do they relate to Jesus' life and ministry?**

**A:** The four servant songs (Isaiah 42:1-4, 49:1-6, 50:4-9, and 52:13-53:12) are strategically placed in Second Isaiah to offer hope and consolation to a suffering Israel during its Babylonian Exile.

Israel had been defeated by the Babylonians, who destroyed their temple, killed the last of the kings in David's lineage, exiled them from their land, and transported them to Babylon. This is the context in which Second Isaiah composes his powerfully poetic book of hope and consolation. A significant part of that message is the portrait of God's servant, who is called to be a source of hope and encouragement for the people.

Each of the four poems emphasizes God's choice and election of the servant. The last poem stresses the suffering and rejection of God's servant, along with his eventual death. Isaiah is certain that God will use the servant's innocent suffering as a way to redeem and remove the guilt and sin of others. Thus, the servant becomes a source of salvation for himself and for others.

Who is this servant? Many suggest that Isaiah was referring to Israel herself, as she underwent exilic suffering which would ultimately prove to be redemptive. Jesus' followers, including those for whom Mark wrote his Gospel, understood Jesus' ministry in terms of Isaiah's suffering servant whose innocent suffering and death became the means of salvation for all.

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## **Pontifical Good Friday Collection**

What has been accomplished?

Last year's Pontifical Good Friday collection:

- Supported 23 parishes and 3 academic institutions.
- Provided a home in Bethlehem for 30 Children from homes facing domestic violence.

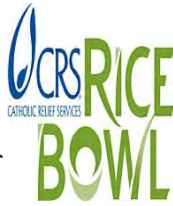

Parishioners are encouraged to prepare for the Easter Triduum and Easter by striving to meet Jesus in the Sacrament of Reconciliation that is Confession before the Easter Triduum.
